After twelve years at Illiana, math teacher Kim Mesman is leaving Illiana. After this school year she is getting married and moving to Indianapolis.


"I feel like I have found my niche here [at Illiana]," said Mesman. "It is hard to leave something you've grown to love."

Well, let's be honest, I still haven't really matured. I'm still the 12 year old who laughs at the dumbest stuff and is



endorse the weekend-long musical events through social media. Because of Coachella's rising popularity, other concert and music festivals have become summer staple for young adventurers across the country.




