VETERANS DAY

Since the end of the First World War, November 11 has been a day set aside to thank the men and women who have served in the Armed Forces, protecting our nation both at home and abroad.

To honor these veterans, this past November 11 Illiana students, faculty and local military veterans assembled at the school's flagpole for a flag-raising ceremony, to recite the Pledge of Allegiance and to listen to a short devotional written by Mr. Jeff White. White spoke about John 15:13 which reads, "Greater love has no one than this: that one lay down his life for his friends." (NIV) White explained that even though many veterans did not suffer from wounds received from combat or endure the

hardships of captivity, all veterans ultimately serve for a cause greater than themselves. That cause is to secure and defend our nation along with the rights and freedoms we often take for granted. After devotions, the flag was raised by Tyler Schutt and Nate DeVries while Mark Hale and Jonathan Rietveld played "The Star Spangled Banner."

Once the Pledge of Allegiance was recited by all, the students and faculty resumed their usual class schedule, but the veterans were treated to an "all you can eat" breakfast buffet in the Dining Hall. Members of Student Council served food and drink while the veterans enjoyed the ample time available to get acquainted and share stories with each other.

After breakfast came to an end, an all-school chapel service was held in the old gymnasium featuring Illiana alumnus, Marine Corps Captain Tim Vermeer, as the speaker. Vermeer's talk was focused on the service of three Christian men: one who served in World War II, one who served during the Vietnam War and later served Illiana for many years as a building custodian, and a third man with whom he served, but who was later killed in action while serving in Afghanistan. Each of these men held true to their Christian faith when serving our country under the most difficult of circumstances.

"Thank you to all veterans for your service and sacrifice for our country, and thank you to those who joined us at Illiana on November 11, it was our pleasure to have you here."





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SIDEWAYS STORIES FROM WAYSIDE SCHOOL"



On November 5, 6, and 7, the Drama Department performed "Sideways Stories from Wayside School," a lighthearted children's production which included a lot of unique stage effects. In addition to writing half of the play themselves, director Jeff DeVries and set designer Jim Kamphuis had to figure out how to create a wall-sized teacher made of school supplies, sounds for imaginary instruments, and a playground for teenagers.

DeVries recorded many different sound effects, including singing all the different parts of the songs featured in the play and then using digital effects to make each instrument unique. "It was a challenge," DeVries said. "I had to make sounds like an instrument, but not one that anyone's ever heard of. I think my wife enjoyed hearing me sing to myself like a lunatic in my office."

Senior Katie Ericks, an actress who played one of the make believe instruments, said that after adding the music, "You could really start to see the whole thing come together."

Kamphuis was responsible for engineering Miss Zarves, a giant wall made of school supplies which was built to look like a teacher's face, complete with a moving mouth, a wiggling nose, and spinning eyes. He also created a playground built for "big kids pretending to be little." The challenge was making it safe to be used without actually attaching it to the stage.

Kamphuis explained, "Set design is like building with Legos-everything is interchangeable. You already have the bases, but you add the color and rearrange them."

Calvin Christian School 5th grader Christian Stokes said, "Were those instruments real? Cause they sounded really cool. And I didn't expect [Miss Zarves] to move! All of a sudden, she just started talking!"

SET IN AN OFF-BEAT GRADE SCHOOL, this kooky montage of hilarious scenes warmed the hearts of all who viewed it. The twisted tales ranged from teachers turning into apples to selling toes to mushroom surprises—all of which coaxed laughs out of young and old, bringing everyone back to their youth.

Director Jeff DeVries said, "Everybody in the cast found their character and their part. They brought energy, and in that sense they were great." He also said that he saw many kids from the Thursday morning performance who brought their families back for other performances. "That's pretty high praise that the kids wanted to come back. It shows that the play worked well."

"Overall, I think it went very well," said set designer Jim Kamphuis. "Even with some minor glitches, I think everyone who went to the play had a really good experience." He added that he was nervous about a few technological issues like the disco ball coming down or the microphones not working, but in the end the production was extremely successful.

Over its 5 performance run, 1,696 people attended the play. Ticket sales from the event covered the costs which included make-up, costumes, light fixtures, repairs, and set pieces. The remaining profit will be used to fund the drama department's future productions.

Out of all the hilarity experienced during the play weekend, one performance stuck out to Kamphuis. He thought that the Thursday matinee, attended by grade schoolers from around the area, was especially entertaining. "Those kids had so much fun at that performance. They sang along with everything and clapped. They were a great audience"

On Saturday evening November 21st, Illiana held its first annual auction. The proceeds of the auction will be used to support Illiana Athletics and the Christian Aid Fund.

Although the weather outside was frightful, the atmosphere inside was electric! Those at the auction were treated to Culver's chicken, P.I.E. barbecues, and Joel Van Drunen's famous pulled pork. Numerous handmade desserts were also available. Hundreds of items, including smart TVs, yard games, drones, laptops, Blackhawks tickets, Bulls tickets and a few weekend getaways, were all auctioned off to the highest bidder. GIRLS VOLLEYBALL continued to sustain success at all three levels. The Freshmen, coached by Adam Clark, finished 8-7, and the J/V team, coached by Richelle VanderZee, ended the season at 17-11. The Varsity team, led by Nikki Van Dyke and Heather Byma, had an overall record of 17-11 and 11-1 in the Conference, earning them the co-championship title with Timothy Christian. Gina Novotny, Mikinsey Pruim and Sydnee VanBeek were named to the All-Conference Team, and Sydnee VanBeek was also selected to be the MVP of the Metro-Suburban East Division by the coaches.

GIRLS TENNIS J/V tennis coached by Diane Bilyeu, continued to learn and improve, finishing at 2-9 and ending their season by taking 2nd place at the Metro Tournament. The Varsity, coached by Rob Lagerwey, had a stellar season, ending with an 11-3 record, putting them in 2nd place in the Metro Suburban Conference. Named All- Conference were Collette Bouwer, Lauren Carlson, Amanda Eberly, Emily Ipema, Esther Lagerwey, Jensen McGuire, Parker Roeda and Hilary VanDrunen. Because of their class trip to Washington DC, the seniors could not compete in the State tournament, but that did not hinder Illiana's success. The team finished 2nd at Sectionals. Collette Bouwer and Jensen McGuire took 1st place in the doubles division of Regionals and qualified for State.

GIRLS CROSS COUNTRY finished second in their division in the Metro Suburban. Named to the All-Conference team were Brittany Groen, Gabby Kreykes, and Cate Peerbolte. The varsity team finished in 12th place out of 25 teams in post season Sectionals. Cate Peerbolte received All-State recognition as well as being named the Illiana MVP. Aerial Shaffer earned the Most-Improved Award, and Juliana Knot received the Spirit Award. The girls' team was coached by Deb Top, Luke Fennema and Laura Perschbacher.

BOYS GOLF coached by Jack Rudenga, continued to dominate. The Varsity team had an overall season record of 9-3 and a Conference record of 5-1, placing them 2nd overall in the Metro. Named All-Conference were John Hayes, Curtis Tempelman and Matthew Zandstra. Zandstra was also the MVP and Regional Champion. The team finished their season at Sectionals. The F/S team earned 1st place in the Conference and finished with a perfect 13-0 record. Congratulations!



F R O M C H A P E L: PASSION AS WORSHIP

As part of a monthly subtheme on worship, chapel committee asked several students and one teacher to talk about their passion (for video games, for playing the saxaphone, for biking) and how that could be a form of worship. Here is what one student said about her passion for art.

"How did you discover your passion?"

Well, it isn't something I necessarily "discovered." I started to take an interest in arts and crafts as a little kid, and as I grew, I guess it just grew with me. I feel like that's how most passions are-- you never need to go out searching for the things that you love, they just have a way of finding you. Art is something that God has gradually woven into my life, and I thank Him every day for blessing me with my abilities; they are a part of who I am.

The effort needed to take an image in your mind and transfer it onto a blank sheet of paper can be an extremely frustrating process, and it takes me a lot of time, especially since it almost never turns out the way I pictured it. Sometimes I will finish a drawing and fall in love with it and think, "Wow! Look at it! I did something!" Then, over time, I'll become more and more unsure of it, and when tomorrow rolls around, I will think, "Oh my gosh! Why do I try to do things?!?" Making mistakes is part of improving.

Every once in a while, I'll make a picture I'm honestly proud of, and I will continue to love it. I think it's okay to be proud sometimes (pride in itself is not a sin) although there is a line, and it can be hard to know when you've crossed it. We are created in the image of God, Who upon creating, acknowledged His good works. If we work hard at something, we can be proud of that creation as long as we know in our hearts that we do all things through Him, Who gave us everything.

I also find that if you have the effort and time, you don't always have a creative idea to work at. And if you have a creative idea, you can't always find the willpower or time to make it happen. It is one or the other, rarely ever both. So the way I keep my passion alive is by taking it with me everywhere I can because sketching doesn't always have to be a stressful, detailed process. Sometimes I'll just draw silly cartoons in my planner for myself and other people to cheer them up, or I'll play a drawing game with my family. It helps me connect with people on a lot of levels. Art also helps me stay calm and listen when I can't sit still or focus.

"How does your passion connect to your God-given talents?"

My God-given talent is my passion. So the question I should ask myself is how am I showing others that

my passion is from God? After all, it's not like I'm going around drawing still-lifes of Jesus hanging on the cross, or the nativity scene; I don't think that's necessary for worship. What is important is if you can find some way to reflect God in your work and bring glory back to Him. I am still searching for the best way to do this. It's what I struggle with the most.

There are times when my talent can be a hassle or times when I simply don't feel like trying my hardest. After all, you don't always get to draw what you like. My favorite thing to draw is people, especially famous people. But I know that if I want to improve, I must study all areas of art, even the ones I don't enjoy as much.

My dream (God willing) is to have a job centered on art--I know that seems unrealistic. But I don't know what God has planned for me yet, or if drawing is what He wants me to pursue as a career. For instance, what if when I grow up, I discover I am good at something else? And that goes for everyone here who feels "untalented." Don't say that so soon! God knows your abilities better than you know yourself, and I promise you, He has blessed you with talents; you only have yet to discover them. We're still so young, in the heart of life. I am only 15! I have a whole new horizon of opportunity waiting for me when school is over. Because the world is a lot bigger outside the walls of Illiana, I could find my calling as a vet, as an engineer, as a youth leader or something else. Maybe that sounds overly optimistic, but you never know. That is why God is so wonderful and mysterious. And no matter what, His plans work out for His glory, so you can trust Him.

And if you're confused and stressed about your gifts, bring it up with the One who gave you those gifts, God. He might open your heart to something that's never crossed your mind or guide you to someone who can share their wisdom with you. I pray that God helps you find your passion and helps you use those talents to strengthen not only your own faith, but the faith of those around you.

What do Dory (the blue fish from the movie "Finding Nemo") and Zacchaeus have in common? Absolutely nothing!!! However, when you combine the names and the actions of both of the stories, you will discover that more than 100 Illiana students wear blue and white shirts which show their commitment to helping others.

Last year we started the Dory program. I got the idea from watching the movie "Finding Nemo" with my kids. I was always struck that in the beginning of the movie, every creature in the whole ocean hung out together, laughing, joking, and having a great time. But when trouble happens, and Nemo is taken, everyone scatters. There is no one to help Marlin find his son except for one crazy blue fish named Dory. Dory helped Marlin and

stood by his side through the hard times. He was really the only friend he had.

It turns out that we all need Dorys in our lives to befriend us and help us. So last year, I decided to form a group of committed kids who would try their best to make sure no one is alone here at Illiana. Now I know that is a lofty goal and difficult to achieve, but we wanted to try. I had about 35 kids sign up to be a Dory. They wore a blue shirt that indicated if you need anything, I am here for you.

However, I realized that it is really hard for kids (and most people, for that matter) to ask for help. We needed to take a more direct approach, and that is where the story of Zacchaeus comes in. I love that when Jesus sees Zacchaeus up in the tree, He takes the bold approach. He says, "Zacchaeus, you come down because I am coming over to your house." Jesus doesn't give Zacchaeus a chance to say no or give

excuses. Jesus just says that He is coming over. It is bold, direct, and awesome.

So, we added that philosophy to the Dory program. We wanted the Dorys to be bolder and more direct. We want them to share the love of Jesus with people and bring that love to them instead of waiting for people to come to them. So that is where the name Dorchaeus comes from. I remember thinking that this name is just dumb enough to work. And did it ever work. Illiana now has 104 Dorchaeus, all of whom want to share Jesus' love with their fellow classmates. Is it perfect? No way. Did some sign up for the free shirts? Maybe. Have we missed some kids? I am sure we have. Are most trying to serve God in the best way they know how? Absolutely. I am very proud of all my students as we try to live the gospel every day, showing the love of Jesus to everyone.

GO Club has sponsored a dodgeball tournament at Illiana for the last 7 years. The goal of the tournament is to promote unity in the student body and the larger Illiana community. Each year, the proceeds from the event are donated to a worthy cause in the community. This year, Chicago Christian High School and Trinity Christian College also hosted dodgeball tournaments, with the winners from all three schools competing at a community tournament at Trinity. The proceeds from all four events (totaling nearly \$25,000) were given to Katie Vree, a graduate of Chicago Christian and nursing student at Trinity. In 2011, Katie was paralyzed due to a virus attacking her spinal cord. The money will be used to purchase a standing wheelchair for Katie to enable her to continue her nursing education.
